DEVELOPING OPPORTUNITY IN BOONE COUNTY

Throughout the state, rural communities are investing in the development of Industrial Parks to better position their communities for business expansion and recruitment within targeted sectors. An industrial park is a portion of land that is zoned for industrial use rather than residential or commercial needs.

Industrial Parks can lead to the creation of new jobs, improve the tax base, aid in business retention, promote business diversity, and spur business growth in surrounding areas. These Industrial Parks are commonly owned by a city or village, local non- profit economic development groups, or electrical providers, who then manage the site and actively promote and prepare the site to be shovel ready for businesses looking to start, expand, or relocate.

In 2021, BCDA, worked with a local landowner to secure 28 acres of land, creating the Boone County Industrial Park, now zoned Heavy Industrial, with highway frontage along highway 39 and rail access, the site is an ideal location for the business sector Boone County is looking to attract. To date, the agency has sold 10 of the 28 acres to Dallas and Krista Choat, for the expansion of their local business, DC Seed & Chemical, LLC. There are currently three additional projects that have expressed interest in the site; interested projects go through an application process to help determine the viability of the project and assess project timeline and needs.

There is also potential for the site to be considered for business opportunities that come directly from the Nebraska Department of Economic Development and utility partners working with site selectors for businesses looking to expand or relocate to Nebraska. The agency serves as the county contact when these opportunities arise and submits proposals for Boone County to be considered. With non-profit status, BCDA qualifies to apply for available grants and funds to assist with the continued efforts of preparing the site to be shovel and market ready.

Speed to market and eliminating barriers for selection by having due-diligence items completed, is a crucial factor site selectors consider when looking at prospective sites. The goal is to have on-going communication with the state and utility partners in combination with continued marketing efforts, to not only sell the remainder of the BCDA site, but also draw more interest to Boone County and other available land and lots as well.

While recruiting new business to the area is an ongoing effort, taking care of our existing businesses by having readily available land for their expansion plans is also a priority. The agency also acknowledges that many of our current businesses are experiencing workforce shortages and while adding more businesses to the area may not seem ideal, new business can lead to more people and families moving to the area which increases the pool of potential workforce for our existing businesses. Furthermore, BCDA has identified workforce development and support as one of the top three areas of focus for the next two years, with initiatives already in progress.

BCDA looks forward to continuing our efforts in supporting the growth of Boone County.

EMPOWERING ST. EDWARD

While the St. Edward Public Library is a quiet and welcoming place to find a great book, the space has also become a hub for elevating the sense of community. Director, Vickie Fritzges, continues to see and fill needs by creating a unique assortment of programming.

A few years ago, Fritzges saw an opportunity to help welcome and support the diverse population of St. Edward's residents. The library was awarded the Libraries Transforming Communities grant through the American Library Association, which provided funds for Fritzges to develop an ESL program at the library. To lead the class, she enlisted the help of Tammy and Jose Gonzalez of Albion, who shaped the program to be centered on realworld needs. As an example, one session was focused on common hand tools. Participants were asked to bring in tools they use often and were able to expand their communication skills in a way that's more relevant to their daily lives. Classes meet Friday evening at 6 p.m. in the Community Room of the library, and are free to all participants. Child care is provided, which also helps build a sense of community across St. Edward.


Fritzges has also brought yoga to the community. Last winter, chair yoga was offered to older adults as a way to bring people together and encourage regular exercise. Similarly a kids yoga class has been offered this fall by Britt Foster of Goldenrod Yoga. The class introduced the practice to children and helped them understand the



mental and physical benefits of stretching and slow movement. Fritzges believes offering yoga classes in the library will continue as schedules allow.

Further showcasing the flexibility of the space, the St. Edward Public Library is also home to both adult and children art classes. Both are led by local artist, Jerene Kruse and often feature painting projects, which have included still life floral and landscape paintings. Like the yoga classes, the art programs have been well attended-including a youth class consisting of 55 participants-and will be continued into the winter.

Beyond these programs, the library hosts a wealth of educational opportunities. From learning about ocean life to discovering how to research family history, Fritzges is finding ways to engage and inspire the St. Edward community and beyond. Currently she is working with the Department of Labor and a local career coach to develop classes on various job search skills and career options.

BOONE CO. BIG GIVE - PRIMROSE

The Boone County Big Give is creating two opportunities to support the village of Primrose. This small but mighty community works diligently to welcome friends and families back to the area, and its volunteer firemen and women are committed to keeping both residents and visitors safe.

Dubbed "the Leaning Pole of Primrose", the Village of Primrose is raising funds to replace the flag pole located in Memorial Park. Ever-changing conditions and strong storms with high winds this past year have led to a permanent bend in the current pole. Over the last several years, Primrose has made great improvements to its community park, including updated sidewalks and signage, picnic areas and more.

Primrose Rural Fire District #5 consists of volunteers who are specially trained to assist the community and beyond in a wide assortment of ways. This year, the Primrose fire department needs funds to purchase cribbing gear.

Cribbing gear supports vehicles and other equipment as the result of an accident. It provides protection for both the firemen working the scene and those involved in the accident. Like other area fire departments, the Primrose team assists its community and provides mutual aid to other area departments when it's needed. The cribbing kit costs approximately \$7,200.
